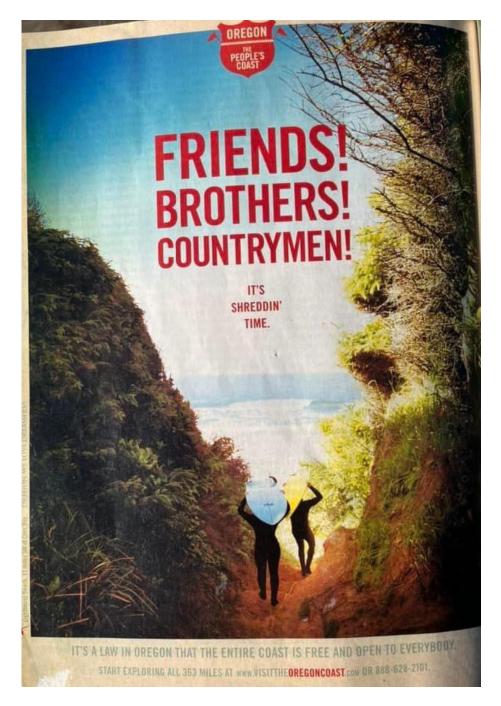

12	CLAIM FOR RELIEF: (Public Easement by Prescription)	
13	1.	
14	Plaintiff The Surfrider Foundation ("Surfrider") is a national non-profit	
15	organization dedicated to the protection and enjoyment of our world's ocean, waves,	
16	and beaches, for all people, through a powerful activist network. Surfrider's grassroots	
17	network has approximately 80 chapters working towards its mission located throughout	
18	the United States, including its Coos Bay Chapter in Oregon. One of Surfrider's five	
19	primary initiatives is protecting public beach access.	
20	2.	
21	The Jay O'Leary Living Trust, Jay O'Leary Trustee, owns real property located at	
22	Map No, 26S14W04CD, Tax Lot or Parcel No. 1700 in Coos County, Oregon, near the	
23	City of Coos Bay (the "O'Leary Property"). This property is located west of address	
24	89181 Lighthouse Way, and east of address 89167 Lighthouse Way. Other than a trail	
25	to Lighthouse beach, the property is unimproved.	
26	3.	
27	On the western side of the O'Leary Property is a trail which extends from	

1 Lighthouse Way, onto the public beach area. This is a location known locally as the 2 Lighthouse Beach Trail. See, Exhibit A, attached to and incorporated by reference into 3 this Complaint (A copy of the original Plat Map, with an arrow indicating the approximate location of the Lighthouse Beach Trail). 4 5 4. The original Plat Map for this neighborhood (Exhibit A) included a footpath to the 6 beach in this same location that was: "dedicate[d] to the use of the public forever". See, 7 8 Exhibit A. That dedication was vacated in 1960. However, members of the public continued to use and to maintain the Lighthouse Beach Trail, despite that vacation, up until very recently when the defendants cut off access to that Trail and then 10 11 subsequently damaged that Trail. 5. 12 13 Members of the public – including but not limited to Surfrider members – have used the Lighthouse Beach Trail regularly and continuously from at least approximately 14 15 1965 to 2021. The Lighthouse Beach Trail is and has been well known as the primary 16 public access point for recreation, water quality monitoring, community beach cleanups, 17 and stewardship. Generations of public users have openly, notoriously, and adversely 18 used that Trail to access Lighthouse Beach. The Trail is well known in the local 19 community, and beyond. For example, the following advertisement – which is a photo taken on the Lighthouse Beach Trail - was run in Outside Magazine, in 2008, by the 20 21 **Oregon Coast Visitors Association:** 1111 22 23 1111 24 1111 1111 25 26 1111

Members of the public – including but not limited to Surfrider members – have used the Lighthouse Beach Trail on the O'Leary Property openly and notoriously from at least approximately 1965 to 2021.

Members of the public – including but not limited to Surfrider members – have

used the Lighthouse Beach Trail on the O'Leary Property in a manner adverse to the property owner's (including but not limited to The Jay O'Leary Living Trust and/or Jay O'Leary) exclusive use and possession of the property, from approximately 1965 to 2021.

8.

It is Surfrider's understanding and belief that over the years, a number of "no trespassing" signs have been installed on the O'Leary Property, by the defendants or someone acting on their behalf or with their permission. It is Surfrider's understanding and belief that over the years, there have periodically been fences installed on the property by the defendants or someone acting on their behalf or with their permission, for the purpose of trying to prevent members of the public from using the Lighthouse Beach Trail. Some or all of those fences have been breached or removed by members of the public.

9.

Based on the adverse use of the Lighthouse Beach Trail for more than ten (10) years, a public prescriptive easement came into existence, allowing use of that Trail by members of the public to access Lighthouse Beach.

10.

Starting in March 2021, defendants, or an agent of defendants or someone acting with the permission of the defendants, again blocked the Lighthouse Beach Trail on the O'Leary Property, this time with barbed wire, and other materials in an attempt to preclude public access to Lighthouse Beach using the Lighthouse Beach Trail. That person or persons also damaged or destroyed portions of the Trail, in a further attempt to preclude public access to Lighthouse Beach using the Lighthouse Beach Trail.

11.

At some time in the first half of 2022, defendants, or someone acting on behalf of defendants, installed a new even more robust fence, placed one or more newly downed

trees across the path, and removed and/or destroyed the steps built on the Lighthouse Beach Trail in the 1960s by members of the public (and used by generations of public Trail users to access the beach). In addition, defendants or someone acting on their behalf or permission installed motion sensors with audible alarms on the property, such that use of the Lighthouse Beach Trail would trigger those alarms.

12.

Plaintiff has no plain, adequate, or speedy remedy at law.

13.

Plaintiff requests this Court's decree and judgment declaring that: (a) The Lighthouse Beach Trail on the O'Leary Property is subject to a public easement by prescription, in favor of the State of Oregon and its Citizens, allowing them to access Lighthouse Beach via the Trail through defendant's property; (b) Defendants must cease and desist from interfering with public access to the beach on that Trail; and (c) That defendants are required to restore the steps on the Lighthouse Beach Trail that were removed by defendants or their agents from that public Trail, to the same or similar condition that they were in before they were removed.

- WHEREFORE, Plaintiff requests that this Court grant the following relief:
- 19 1. A judgment declaring that the Lighthouse Beach Trail on the O'Leary Property is subject to an easement by prescription, on behalf of the public;
 - 2. An injunction preventing the defendants, or anyone acting on behalf of the defendants, from blocking public access to Lighthouse Beach Trail on the O'Leary Property;
- 24 3. An injunction requiring the defendants, or someone acting on behalf of the defendants, to restore the steps; and,
- 26 4. Such other relief as the Court deems just, equitable, and proper.

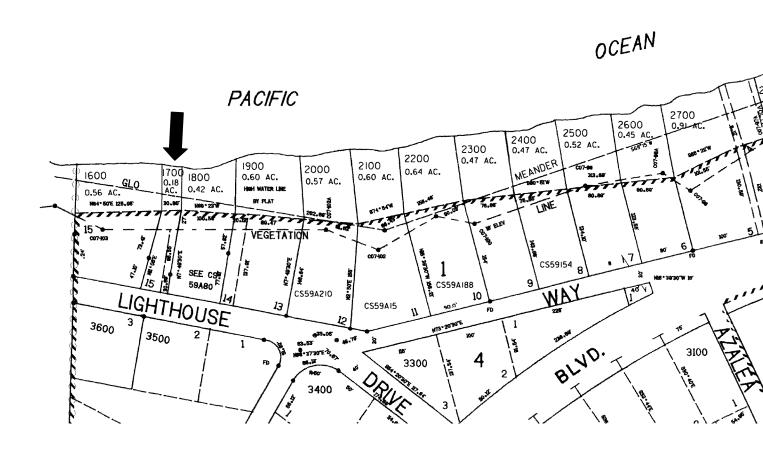
